History of Fine Art
This type of art dates back to the Acheulian period of prehistoric art : to proto-sculptures such as the Venus of Berekhat Ram (a basaltic figurine, 230,000-700,000 BCE) and the Venus of Tan-Tan (quartzite figurine, 200,000-500,000 BCE); and to cave paintings from Chauvet Cave (c.30,000 BCE), Lascaux, Altamira, Pech-Merle, and Cosquer.

**Fine Art-Definition: Meaning, History**
In European academic traditions, fine art is art developed primarily for aesthetics or beauty, distinguishing it from decorative art or applied art, which also has to serve some practical function, such as pottery or most metalwork. In the aesthetic theories developed in the Italian Renaissance, the highest art was that which allowed the full expression and display of the artist's imagination, unrestricted by any of the practical considerations involved in, say, making and decorating a teapot. 1

Establishment of the CFA. Upon its creation by Congress on 17 May 1910, the Commission of Fine Arts was authorized to advise on the location of statues, fountains and monuments in public areas in the District of Columbia. Its thematic scope grew quickly to include public buildings erected by the federal government within the District of Columbia ( Executive Order 1259 ), and parks, coins, and medals ( Executive Order 3524 ).
