Linguistic theory and aphasia: an overview

This is called non-fluent aphasia, or Broca's aphasia. I remember this by thinking that Broca's aphasia means "broken speech," and aphasia is just any type of disorder that involves language. When Wernicke's area, back in the temporal lobe, is damaged, you get Wernicke's aphasia, which is quite a different pattern of behavior than you get with Broca's apahasia.

Aphasia is a language disorder acquired subsequent to brain damage that affects production and understanding of spoken and written language in varying degrees and patterns associated with the size and site of the lesion (see Symptoms and Neurological Correlates).

Aphasia is not caused by damage to the brain that results in motor or sensory deficits, which produces abnormal speech; that is, aphasia is not related to the mechanics of speech but rather the individual's language cognition (although a person can have both problems, particularly if they suffered a hemorrhage that damaged a large area of the brain). An individual's "language" is the socially shared set of rules, as well as the thought processes that go behind verbalized speech.

Aphasia Theories It was difficult to find a theory of aphasia that met all these criteria, but one that generally has the features of a good theory is the localizationist theory of aphasia. It has its roots in 19th century aphasiology and has been further elaborated by others (e.g., Goodglass and Kaplan, 1983).
