Prêmio São Paulo de Literatura recebe inscrições até 7 de maio

De Liev Tolstoi. Lançada em julho, a tradução - diretamente do russo - de Rubens Figueiredo oferece uma nova versão do clássico de Liev Tolstoi. De R\$ 84,90 por R\$ 54,90 (Companhia das Letras).

Um professor de educação física busca refúgio em Garopaba, um pequeno balneário de Santa Catarina, após a morte do pai. O protagonista (cujo nome não se conhece) se afasta da relação conturbada com os outros membros da família e mergulha em um isolamento geográfico e psicológico. Ao mesmo tempo, ele empreende a busca pela verdade no caso da morte do avô, Gaudério, que teria sido assassinado décadas antes na mesma Garopaba, na época apenas uma vila de pescadores. Sempre acompanhado por Beta, cadela do falecido pai, o professor mergulha na investigação sobre o misterioso Gaudério, esquadrinhando as lacunas do pouco que lhe é revelado, a contragosto, pelos moradores mais antigos da cidade. Portador de uma condição neurológica congênita que o obriga a interagir com as outras pessoas de um modo peculiar, o professor estabelece relações com alguns moradores - uma garçonete e seu filho pequeno, os alunos da natação, um budista histriônico, a secretária de uma agência turística de passeios. Aos poucos, ele vai reunindo as peças que talvez lhe permitirão entender melhor a própria história. 'Barba Ensopada de Sangue' se propõe a resgatar e levar às últimas consequências temas e conflitos das obras anteriores do autor tais como - a construção da identidade e, nesse processo, as dificuldades que se enfrenta para entender e reconhecer os outros; a necessidade inconfessa de uma reparação talvez inviável; a busca pela unidade entre mente e corpo; o consolo afetivo que o contato com a natureza e os animais é capaz de proporcionar; os diversos tipos de violência que podem irromper em meio a uma existência domesticada.

From Brazil's most acclaimed young novelist, the mesmerizing story of how a troubled young man's restorative journey to the seaside becomes a violent struggle with his family's past — So why did they kill him? — I'm getting there. Patience, tchê. I wanted to give you the context. Because it's a good story, isn't it? A young man's father, close to death, reveals to his son the true story of his grandfather's death, or at least the truth as he knows it. The mean old gaucho was murdered by some fellow villagers in Garopaba, a sleepy town on the Atlantic now famous for its surfing and fishing. It was almost an execution, vigilante style. Or so the story goes. It is almost as if his father has given the young man a deathbed challenge. He has no strong ties to home, he is ready for a change, and he loves the seaside and is a great ocean swimmer, so he strikes out for Garopaba, without even being quite sure why. He finds an apartment by the water and builds a simple new life, taking his father's old dog as a companion. He swims in the sea every day, makes a few friends, enters into a relationship, begins to make inquiries. But information doesn't come easily. A rare neurological condition means that he doesn't recognize the faces of people he's met, leading frequently to awkwardness and occasionally to hostility. And the people who know about his grandfather seem fearful, even haunted. Life becomes complicated in Garopaba until it becomes downright dangerous. Steeped in a very special atmosphere, both languid and tense, and soaked in the sultry allure of south Brazil, Daniel Galera's masterfully spare and powerful prose unfolds a story of discovery that feels

almost archetypal—a display of storytelling sorcery that builds with oceanic force and announces one of Brazil's greatest young writers to the English-speaking world. Look for Daniel's new book, *The Shape of Bones*.

O autor de *Barba ensopada de sangue*, vencedor do Prêmio São Paulo de Literatura, nos traz um livro marcante, que toma caminhos inesperados para narrar um mundo em rápida transformação. As três histórias deste volume vão do passado recente ao futuro distante, e falam de expectativas e perdas, e de como reconstruir a vida a partir de nossos próprios erros. Daniel Galera expande as possibilidades da literatura nas três novelas reunidas neste livro. Em "O deus das avencas", que abre este volume, um casal se fecha em casa à espera do nascimento do primeiro filho, e mergulha numa incerteza crescente, tanto pelo destino deles quanto pelos rumos do país. Em "Tóquio", Galera abandona a narrativa mais realista ao retratar a vida de um homem solitário, obrigado a enfrentar o passado em um mundo que atravessou um desastre ambiental e tecnológico. E, por fim, em "Bugônia", ele dá um passo além ao recriar a história de uma comunidade pós-apocalíptica em simbiose com a natureza, que, pressionada pelas ameaças externas de um planeta devastado, precisa se transformar de forma radical. *O deus das avencas* é um livro especulativo e por vezes sombrio, mas extremamente humano.

Retratando com maestria a geração que cresceu nos anos 1990, chega o novo romance do premiado autor de *Barba ensopada de sangue*. Em meio a uma onda de calor devastadora e a uma greve de ônibus que paralisa a cidade, três amigos se reencontram em Porto Alegre. No final dos anos 1990, eles haviam incendiado a internet com o *Orangotango*, um fanzine digital que se tornou cultuado em todo o Brasil. Agora, quase duas décadas depois, a morte do quarto integrante do grupo vai reaproximar Aurora, cientista e pesquisadora vivendo uma pequena guerra acadêmica, Antero, artista de vanguarda convertido em publicitário, e Emiliano, jornalista que tem uma difícil tarefa pela frente. Captando com maestria a geração que cresceu em meio ao início da internet, Galera explora essas vidas acuadas entre promessas não cumpridas e anseios apocalípticos. Nas vozes de Aurora, Antero e Emiliano, *Meia-noite e vinte* é um retrato marcante de uma juventude que recebeu um mundo despedaçado e para quem o futuro pode não significar mais nada.

As the collection's title suggests, time's passage is the fil rouge of these stories. All of Tabucchi's characters struggle to find routes of escape from a present that is hard to bear, and from places in which political events have had deeply personal ramifications for their own lives. Each of the nine stories in *Time Ages in a Hurry* is an imaginative inquiry into something hidden or disguised, which can be uncovered not by reason but only by feeling and intuition, by what isn't said. Disquieted and disoriented yet utterly human in their loves and fears, the characters in these vibrant and often playful stories suffer from what Tabucchi once referred to as a "corrupted relationship with history." Each protagonist must confront phantoms from the past, misguided or false beliefs, and the deepest puzzles of identity--and each in his or her own way ends up experiencing "an infinite sense of liberation, as when finally we understand something we'd known all along and didn't want to know."

Inspired by author Tori Telfer's Jezebel column "Lady Killers," this thrilling and entertaining

compendium investigates female serial killers and their crimes through the ages. When you think of serial killers throughout history, the names that come to mind are ones like Jack the Ripper, John Wayne Gacy, and Ted Bundy. But what about Tillie Klimek, Moulay Hassan, Kate Bender? The narrative we're comfortable with is the one where women are the victims of violent crime, not the perpetrators. In fact, serial killers are thought to be so universally, overwhelmingly male that in 1998, FBI profiler Roy Hazelwood infamously declared in a homicide conference, "There are no female serial killers." Lady Killers, based on the popular online series that appeared on Jezebel and The Hairpin, disputes that claim and offers fourteen gruesome examples as evidence. Though largely forgotten by history, female serial killers such as Erzsébet Báthory, Nannie Doss, Mary Ann Cotton, and Darya Nikolayevna Saltykova rival their male counterparts in cunning, cruelty, and appetite for destruction. Each chapter explores the crimes and history of a different subject, and then proceeds to unpack her legacy and her portrayal in the media, as well as the stereotypes and sexist clichés that inevitably surround her. The first book to examine female serial killers through a feminist lens with a witty and dryly humorous tone, Lady Killers dismisses easy explanations (she was hormonal, she did it for love, a man made her do it) and tired tropes (she was a femme fatale, a black widow, a witch), delving into the complex reality of female aggression and predation. Featuring 14 illustrations from Dame Darcy, Lady Killers is a bloodcurdling, insightful, and irresistible journey into the heart of darkness.

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
