This subset of media ethics is known as journalism's professional "code of ethics" and the "canons of journalism". Basic Journalism Think of journalistic writing as an inverted pyramid. The top contains only one or two sentences with the most important information first; this is called the lead (pronounced leed and sometimes spelled "lede"). Next, a little more information is given about the story, and so on, until all of the information has been given.
