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Chapter 4: The skin, hair and nails Layers of skin Common integument refers to skin and subcutaneous tissue, hair, nails, and breast. The last-named is described with the upper limb. The skin (cutis) provides a waterproof and protective covering for the body, contains sensory nerve endings, and aids in the regulation of temperature.

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The skin is the epithelial membrane that covers the body surface. Cutaneous membrane is a synonym for skin, as is integument, which means "covering." The integumentary system is the skin and its derivatives (nails, hair, glands).

Chapter 4 Skin and Body Membranes. Body membranes, which cover surfaces, line body cavities, and form protective (and often lubricating) sheets around organs, fall into two major groups. There are (1) epithelial membranes, which include the cutaneous, mucous, and serous membranes, and (2) connective tissue membranes, represented by synovial membranes.
