Dual Diagnosis: My Loved One Abuses Drugs, And Has Other ...

Many people diagnosed with a substance use disorder (SUD) also suffer from a co-occurring mental health or behavioral disorder. This is known as a dual diagnosis. Individuals with a dual diagnosis require an integrated treatment plan that addresses both disorders as interconnected mental health issues. According to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH), 45 percent of people with addiction have a co-occurring mental health disorder.

Difference Between Abuse and Addiction | Dual Diagnosis

A Dual Diagnosis can be made up of any combination of a mental disorder (anxiety, depression, bipolar disorder) and addiction (drugs, alcohol, sex, gambling). Dual Diagnoses that include depressive disorders are among the most common forms of the problem; in fact, the Journal of Clinical Psychiatry reports that one in three adults who struggle with alcohol or drug abuse also suffers from depression.

Depression and Addiction | Dual Diagnosis

A Dual Diagnosis occurs when a single patient is diagnosed with both a mental health disorder and a substance abuse problem.

Dual diagnosis is a term used to describe a person who is diagnosed with a mental illness a substance use or abuse and disorder at the same time. More than half of persons who have a serious mental illness also have a substance use or abuse disorder. Dual diagnosis is sometime referred to as co-occurring disorders or comorbidity.

Substance Use Disorders Substance use disorders — the repeated misuse of alcohol and/or drugs — often occur simultaneously in individuals with mental illness, usually to cope with overwhelming symptoms. The combination of these two illnesses has its own term: dual diagnosis, or co-occurring disorders.
