Whereas the dependent samples t-test tests whether the average difference between two observations is 0 the Wilcoxon test tests whether the difference between two observations has a mean signed rank of 0. Thus it is much more robust against outliers and heavy tail distributions. .

Thus it is much more robust against outliers and heavy tail distributions. Because the Wilcoxon sign test is a non-paracontinuous-level test it does not require a special distribution of the dependent variable in the analysis. Therefore it is the best test to compare mean scores when the dependent variable is not normally distributed and at least of ordinal scale.
